15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

a) The Institution authenticated the vision "Empowerment of women through quality education" by bestowing multidisciplinary courses towards women empowerment to benefit the women community in creating distinguished and dynamic impacts worldwide through quality higher education. The Institution offers unique courses by blending humanities and science through Multidisciplinary Courses (Skill Based Subjects and Non- Major Electives). The Institution offers credit based courses and projects in areas of environmental education and value education with a view to attain holistic multidisciplinary education. b) Integrating Humanities and Science with STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics), Certificate, Diploma and Advanced Diploma Courses are offered under various programmes. The courses such as Tourism and Hospitality Management, Banking Management, Women Entrepreneurship Development, Human Resource Management, Multimedia, Information and Communication Technology, Bio-Medical Instrumentation, Bio-degradable Solid Waste Management, journalism, English for Effective Communication, Merchandising are provided to the students. c) The Institution offers credit based courses and projects in areas of environmental education and value education with a view to attain holistic multidisciplinary education. The students are involved in the community engagement activities and projects in various clubs and committees, which inculcates the social welfare thoughts among the students and provide a fruitful platform to serve the society without any prejudice. d) The Institution has adopted multiple entry and exit system in NEP. The UGC has approved One Diploma, Two Advanced Diploma Courses and Six B.Voc., Programmes among which the institution offers B.Voc., Fashion and Boutique Management programme with flexible curriculum according to the guidelines of NSQF and NSDC assessment & certification. At the end of the second, fourth and sixth semester provides a Certificate, Diploma, Advanced Diploma and UG Degree certificate respectively. e) The management provides financial assistance under "Vellalar Educational Trust Funded Project" scheme to undertake research and find solutions to society's most pressing issues and challenges every year. The students and faculty research is encouraged in the throbbing issues

of the society like preventing pollution, conservation of energy, health & hygiene and so on. The Research Committee ensures integrity and ethics in the research pursuits undertaken. In addition, the Institution releases two International and one National Peer-Reviewed Research journals, the primary goal of which is to contribute to the existing body of knowledge and encourage collaborations. f) The Institutions offers Interdisciplinary Courses (Allied Courses) to foster and promote flexibility, adaptability and versatility among the students. For instance, integrated courses framed with shared course content between M.A (English) and M.A (History), B.A (English) and B.Sc. (Botany) are offered. To provide the students with the opportunities to go beyond their curriculum, integrated Add-on Courses between B.Sc., (Computer Science) and B.Sc., (Physics), B.Sc., (Physics) and B.Sc., (Zoology) are offered. To improve productivity and to enhance the living standards of the graduating scholars, the institution provides Multi-Skill Development Courses and Advanced Multi-Skill Development Courses to all UG and PG programmes which are mapped to job roles and industrial needs respectively. It is made mandatory for the learners to pursue One MOOCs, Add-on course and Skill Based Subjects. As the outcome of the MoU with the Ministry of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME), various Skill Development Courses are introduced to upgrade skills and develop entrepreneurship among the students. Furthermore, a Skill oriented vocational degree programme is offered.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

a) The college intends to send a proposal to register in the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) thereby paving way for credit transfer and student mobility between and within the Institutions. b) Though the HEI has not yet registered under ABC, B.Voc., Fashion and Boutique Management is provided under multiple entry and exit mode with certificates after six months, diploma after one year, advanced diploma after two years and a under graduate degree after three years of study with credit transfer. c) The institution plans to widen new possibilities for the learners and to remove any limitations for seamless collaboration, which enables the exchange and accumulation of academic credits. d) The Board of Studies which is conducted twice in year is responsible for reviewing, monitoring and updating the existing course syllabi and programme structure, teaching and evaluation methodology according to job requirements and modern trends in tune with the feedback of the stakeholders, alumni, industrial experts and needs of the local communities. Students demonstrate their learning goals through Assignments and Seminars, which have constantly been a part of the evaluation

methodology. ICT integrated Teaching-Learning promoted through creation of e-modules which are launched in YouTube channel. Online platforms are employed for teaching, carrying out assignments and sharing study materials. e) In accord with ABC proposed by NEP 2020, along with the existing credits, extra credit are conferred on Add-on and Self-learning courses viz., Spoken Tutorial courses and MOOCs.

17.Skill development:

a) The Institution functions with an objective to enable the younger generation with the practical knowledge and entrepreneurial skills to face the professional challenges in the global arena through vocational programmes. The UGC has approved Six B.Voc., Programmes, One Diploma and Two Advanced Diploma Courses under the National Skills Qualifications Framework (NSQF) from 2020-2021 onwards to impart skill oriented training which in turn improve the employability skills of the beneficiaries and enable them to be skilled professionals. Currently B.Voc., Fashion and Boutique Management programme is offered with NSDC Certification under community college scheme at III Levels. NSDC certified skill based course were also conducted. Institution offered Soft skill training programme to the students for their career development. b) Under Community College Scheme, VCW Community College is established to offer B.Voc., Fashion and Boutique Management programme. Skill enhancement Courses were offered to promote vocational education integrated into mainstream education c) The institute offers Value-Based education to preserves social integrity, cultural and moral values by designing courses on gender, bio-regional consciousness, ethics, moral & social values. The curriculum offers a wider scope for earning extra credits through Self-Learning Courses, Advanced Learners' Courses and Add-on Courses at Certificate / Diploma / Advanced Diploma level. The institution aims at the all-round development of the students through yoga education, which is mandatory during the UG programme. Yoga education endorses human values to reform attitude and behavior, relieve from stress and strain, build-up healthy life-style, shape high moral standards and develop refined personality so as to make them a complete person. Students were educated on societal values through outreach extension activities. Various Skill-Development programmes on entrepreneurship, life style and much more are provided by diverse departments. d) i) In order to promote job skills and advance the career quotient of the students, certificate courses and Add-on courses are made mandatory for the students. ii) MoUs are signed with various industries to foster vocational skills through expert training. Every student has to undergo value added course imparting

vocational skills for minimum of 30 hours duration. Trainers from industry will equip the skills of the students enabling them to become efficient entrepreneurs. The institution avails the expertise and experience of these trainers through Value Added Courses to enhance the practical skills of the students which in turn facilitate them to bridge the academia and the industrial needs and be competent. iii) The vocational courses are offered in on-campus modular mode. iv) B.Voc., Fashion and Boutique Management programme is offered with NSDC Certification at 3 Levels. NSDC certified skill Based course are also offered. v) Skill-Based courses like ICT enabled Teaching and learning, Spoken Tutorial courses, etc., are offered to the learners in blended mode. e) Four skill Enhancement courses offered under MSME and 21 Value added course and 8 Add-on courses are offered. MSME education aims to support new and existing startups in today's business challenges. To prepare the young minds to face these challenges, the institution creates a platform to pursue four skill enhancement courses under MSME and also enables the students to reap the benefits of MSME particularly to have easier access to credit and free ISO certification. Furthermore, 21 value added courses are offered to enhance the students' entrepreneurial skills beyond academic curriculum and 8 Add on Courses are offered to bridge the gap between the academic and industry needs.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

a) The Institution disseminates Indian Knowledge, through many avenues and channels. Part I Tamil imparts native culture and values through vernacular language. Hindi is offered as an alternative thereby promoting flexibility of choice. b) The faculty members adopt in both English and the vernacular (Tamil) bilingual mode of teaching, when necessary to ensure cognition and comprehension in the students. The institution conducts state/national/international level programmes to train and expand the expertise of the faculty members and students in teaching and learning the courses both in English and Tamil. c) Tamil is offered as UG Programme for the students who opt to learn in regional language with the aim of preserving and promoting Indian Arts and Culture, the department of English, History and Tamil offer courses encompassing Indian Arts, Culture and Tradition with the objective of nurturing and sustaining the interest and competency of the students in the vernacular (Tamil) renown scholars and literature are invited periodically to address the students. d) i) The knowledge of Indian Languages and culture is promoted among the students by conducting competitions like debate, essay writing, poem recitation in Tamil, English and

Hindi languages. Awareness programmes are organized for the welfare of the tribal people concerning the knowledge of language and culture. Creative writing workshops are organized to train the students in contributing their write-ups in English, Tamil and Hindi to the College Magazine released annually. ii) History and tribal museums inculcate the knowledge of Indian ancient tradition as houses ancient artefacts. Courses focusing on Indian ancient knowledge are offered by the departments Mathematics, English, Tamil and History namely Vedic Mathematics, Translation Studies, etc. iii) The Department of Physical Education offers Martial Arts to inculcate in the women scholars to the spirit of self-defense, self-discipline and self-confidence. Students are given authentic training in the traditional dances, arts and self-defense of Tamil Nadu like Karagattam, Thapaattam, Silambattam, etc.,. Yoga education is practiced to strengthen the physical and mental health of the students. iv) The Bravura club (Fine Arts Club) organizes various cultural events to display the Indian culture and traditions for and by the students. It hones and fine-tunes the students flair for performing arts like classical dance, folk dances etc., by way of training them with the help of expert trainers and choreographers to be performed on college Annual Day, Sports Day, Pongal Cultural Extravaganza and Talent Shows. e) Festival plays a prime role in preserving cultural heritage, traditions and customs. Adopting that view, Pongal is celebrated with pomp and pageantry by embracing Indian tradition and culture through performing arts like Salangaiattam, Puliattam, Kummi, Kolattam, and so on. In connection with, Holi, the festival of colours and Onam, the festival of annual harvest is also celebrated as the symbol of unity developing a spirit of camaraderie among student and staff community.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

i) In 2018, the institution committed to adopt holistic and student centered learning approach through OBE. This transformational initiative was initially implemented to the first year UG and was gradually extended to the rest of the programmes in the subsequent years. Several workshops and Faculty Development programmes were organized for the faculty members to develop professional competence in the domain of Outcome Based Education System. Simultaneously, a progressive systematized Teaching-learning process is evolved to bring forth the optimistic outcomes through the successful implementation of OBE. ii) Based on OBE, skill oriented curriculum has been incorporated into Non-Major Electives (NME) and Skill-Based Subjects (SBS). The continuous internal assessment holds 25 marks with components such as Seminars, Quiz, Group Discussion, Subject Viva and the regularity in attendance, whereas the external

assessment is weighed for 75 marks. The programme specific outcomes, course outcomes and programme outcomes are mapped and the attainment level is calculated. Gender Studies and Research Projects are assimilated to equip the young women with technical skills and ethical values to lead and serve the Society. The OBE facilitates students to gain proficiency, achieve mastery and to experience effective academic progression with ample prospects for employability and entrepreneurial enterprise. iii) The Institution strives to accomplish good practices in accordance with NEP 2020. The students at UG level are engaged in projects with an aim to serve the community. The vocational degree programme, B.Voc., Fashion and Boutique Management is offered with Multiple entry and exit. STEP is a platform to encourage and execute the entrepreneurial skills of the students. In addition, Health and Wellness club, NCC, NSS, YRC, RRC, etc., are functioning to its best for the inclusive progression of the students.

20.Distance education/online education:

a) The Institution lends space for digital learning environment by implementing technological amenities to upload ODL mode. The campus is IT enabled and includes LMS, Wi-Fi - 24/7, e-studio, projectors, smart classrooms and digital library to compete the competitive digital era. b) Online Learning platform is available for the students and faculty members to bolster the Teaching-Learning enterprise. On the whole the administrative and academic activities of the institution are functioning with effective and updated techno support tools. The Institution promotes digital intelligence via blended learning, practical courses by means of Free and Open Source Software (FOSS) like ICT Tools for Teaching and Learning, Linux and Perl Programming etc., which are included in the curriculum. Virtual laboratory in the Department of Zoology allows the students to participate in lab-based learning exercises free of cost and without the spatial and other constraints of a physical lab. The students and teachers are encouraged to pursue the courses under SWAYAM portal. For all PG Programmes, NPTEL has been made mandatory. In addition to classroom teaching, e-content study materials are prepared to envisage blended learning. In accordance with NEP 2020, the institution adopts good practices related to distance and online education. Multi Skill Development Paper is offered, where the students are prepared for online examination and evaluation. The faculty members from diverse disciplines develop e-content materials in e-studio are uploaded in YouTube and blogs to transfer knowledge in a way to promote digital education and open access to knowledge from all the quarters across the globe. The enrolment in MOOCs is mandatory which provide a Self-Learning space for the students. The

Institution updates and upgrades with the recent technological tools with a view to help and support Teaching-Learning undertakings. The digital library possesses 23 nodes for INFLIBNET (N-List), DELNET, NDLI and Videeya e-books for the benefit of research pursuits. In addition e-books and e-journals are available with ease access.

Hormonal Biochemistry, Human Physiology and Health and Hygiene courses facilitates physical fitness. Women Entrepreneurship Development course offers women empowering factors. Environment and Sustainability: Courses namely Environmental Studies (Foundation Course), Green Literature, Green Management, Green Computing, Ecology and Conservation Policy, Wildlife Diversity and Conservation, Environmental Pollution: Physical Aspects (Non major Elective), Energy Management (Skill Based subject) concentrate on burning environmental issues. Many Environmental Awareness Programmes are organized. Human Values: Value Education, Human Rights, Yoga and Meditation are mandatory courses for all new entrants, and Certificate Programmes like Yoga for Human Excellence and Vivekananda Kendra Examinations are conducted for interested students. Celebrating Human Rights Day, National Unity Day and National Voters Day help students to unconsciously integrate Human values. Professional Ethics: Curriculum nurtures students with professional ethics through courses like Corporate English, Cyber Law and Ethics and Business Ethics and to inculcate basic values like integrity, responsibility and honesty.
